Why Get Certified?

- Certification as a diverse supplier opens doors to:
 - o Corporate and government contracts
 - Supplier diversity programs
 - Networking and mentorship opportunities
 - o Access to capital and training

Tips for a Smooth Certification Process

- Prepare documents: Ownership, tax returns, resumes, proof of identity.
- Be honest and thorough: Incomplete or inaccurate applications can delay approval.
- Follow up: Stay in touch with the certifying body for updates.

Major Certifying Organizations & How to Apply

- 1. National Minority Supplier Development Council (NMSDC)
 - Who it's for: Minority-owned businesses (Black, Hispanic, Asian, Native American)
 - Steps:
 - Business must be at least 51% minority-owned.
 - Apply online and submit documentation (ownership, financials, etc.).
 - Pay a fee and complete a site visit.
- 2. Women's Business Enterprise National Council (WBENC)
 - Who it's for: Women-owned businesses
 - Steps:
 - Business must be 51% woman-owned and controlled.
 - Complete the online application.
 - Submit required documents and pay a fee.
 - Undergo a site visit.
- 3. National LGBT Chamber of Commerce (NGLCC)
 - Who it's for: LGBTQ-owned businesses
 - Steps:
 - Business must be 51% LGBTQ-owned.
 - Apply online with supporting documents.
 - Participate in an interview and review process.
- 4. National Veteran Business Development Council (NVBDC)
 - Who it's for: Veteran-owned businesses
 - Steps:
 - Business must be 51% veteran-owned.
 - Submit military service documentation.
 - Complete the application and pay a fee.
- 5. Disability:IN
 - Who it's for: Disability-owned businesses
 - Steps:
 - Business must be 51% owned by a person with a disability.
 - Provide proof of disability and business ownership.
 - Apply online and pay a fee.
